The Birds of Vermont Museum and Audubon Vermont are sponsoring a special open house on May 12th to celebrate International Migratory Bird Day (IMBD). IMBD is an annual celebration of one of the most important events in the life of a migratory bird – its journey between winter and summer homes. There are hundreds of birds that return to Vermont each spring from their winter habitats. Each year the event focuses on a different topic pertinent to bird conservation. This year, festivals throughout the world are focusing on climate change. The Museum and Audubon Vermont are planning a variety of programs and walks to highlight local migrants and their habitats. STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

In November of 2005 the Museum Board approved a five-year strategic plan. The plan helps guide the Museum with long range activities and provides guidance on capitol projects, program development, and communication goals. The Board has been working in task groups with staff to fulfill these goals.

Goals completed in 2006 and the first part of 2007 include:

- aligning our school programs with Grade Expectations,
- installing a humidifier to help maintain a stable museum environment in the winter,
- writing a communications plan,
- continuing with long-term bird monitoring,
- implementing an internship program,
- and maintaining Museum infrastructure (by replacing the Museum roof in the fall of 2006).


FALL WETLAND DIORAMA

GIFT SHOP UPDATES

Good News!

As of January 1, 2007, the Museum no longer charges sales tax in the gift shop. This is a new law that affects Vermont non-profit shops with a small volume of sales. Come get your feeders, bird guides, kids' books, and other bird-related items and pay no tax! And if you are a member you *still* get 10% off everything in the gift shop!

This year we have put together two kits to assist beginning bird watchers and beginning carvers. The beginning bird watcher kit include a field tested beginners' bird guide, field notebook, pencil, field apron, and a list of binoculars recommended for beginners. Thanks to Gale Lawrence for putting hours into researching the best products. The beginner carver's kit includes a soap carving book, soap, and a collection of handmade tools appropriate for children. Come check these kits out!

In an effort to continue our conservation efforts, we will recycle your small plastic and paper bags in our gift shop. Anything smaller than a grocery bag will be useful to us. We continue to increase our emphasis on protecting the environment through easy steps. Recycle, reuse, buy local, buy items with minimal packaging, use recycled paper products, buy shade grown bird-friendly coffee. These easy steps help a lot in saving our planet.

An excerpt for the Museum's $Mystery\ Bird\ Quest$

Can you figure out where to go?

A simple definition for questing is a treasure hunt where the prize is knowledge. Questing is a form of place-based education giving the participants an opportunity to explore a place in a whole new way. A non-profit organization called Vital Communities has worked for over a decade with children and adults to put together quests in the Connecticut River Valley. Students, families and individuals can enjoy questing just by following the clues. Along the way they might learn about a church in their town, how to measure a tree trunk, what a floodplain is, or where bluebirds nest. The creation of a quest can be a fun project for a group of children, or a group of adults, since the first step is exploration. In addition, it is an activity for all ages that doesn't cost your family anything.

This past March, Audubon Vermont at the Green Mountain Audubon Center held a quest workshop taught by Steve Glazer of Valley Quest. Glazer has an abundance of questing experience. He has been working with Valley Quest a program of Vital Communities. Birds of Vermont Museum has joined the questing craze! Mystery Bird Quest is our first one. Copies of the quest are available at the front desk Come try it out!


VOLUNTEER LUNCH/WORK PARTY
